Barmston Church has in the past supported a little charity with a big name – TABS International – which supports a school in a slum area of Kenya, on the outskirts of Thika, about an hour north of Nairobi. As you read this I'll be about to travel there on a two-week volunteer trip, to see how the project is getting on and to do some



painting and ground work as the school prepares to expand. There will be twelve of us from all parts of the UK, including Kevin Oldfield, a formerly homeless man from Bridlington, who has overcome a number of hurdles to get where he is today. It's going to be an exciting trip.

The church has been celebrating Pentecost, the festival which commemorates the sending of the Holy Spirit on Jesus' first followers, propelling them into the world to share the good news of His resurrection and certain return. In our case, we're more likely to receive messages of faith than give them, but the Spirit-inspired impulse to cross boundaries and travel outwards in Jesus' name remains strong.

Closer to home, during the four Tuesdays in August, Revd Heather will be leading activities for families – both local and visitors – based in the Village Hall. More details in next month's issue.

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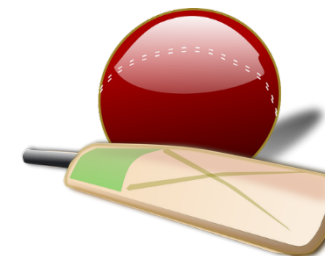

Barmston won the toss and elected to bat scoring 82 for 4. Flamborough then batted scoring 83 for 1 and winning the match by 8 wickets

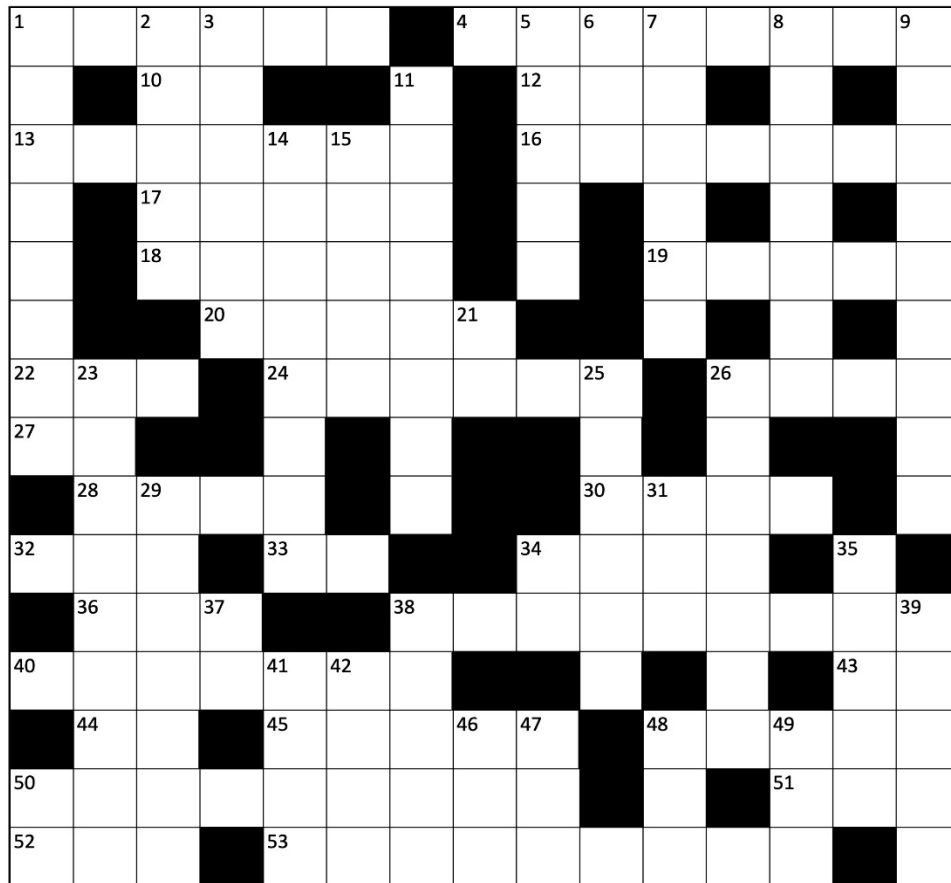

MEMORIES OF OLD BARMSTON& ONE OF ITS FAMILIES

Vera Wiles was married to Allen Croft and they moved to Holly House, Barmston in 1931. Vera's brother, Stanley (George Stanley) married Lillie Danby from Kilham at Barmston Church on the 25th November 1932. The following notes were found on the back cover of a book some years ago:

‘A pretty wedding took place in Barmston on Saturday, the contracting parties being Miss Lily Danby of Kilham, eldest daughter of Mr & Mrs B Danby, Middle Street, Kilham and Mr George Stanley Wiles of Leven. The bride who was given away by her younger brother wore a dress of blue silk, ankle length with shoes and hat to tone. The bridesmaids were sisters of the bride and wore dresses of flowered silk and brooches, gifts of the Bridegroom. The duties of Best man were carried out by Mr Percy Foster of Kelk. The parties were well known in Kilham and Barmston district. A reception was held in the home of the Bride and they were recipients of a large number of costly and useful presents. The honeymoon was being spent in Hull.’

It sounded like a very happy country wedding, far removed from the lavish and expensive events often staged now-a-days when folk get married.

After their wedding, they lived in cottage between the blacksmith's and the grocer's shops in Sands Lane. In 1935, with their first child on the way, they moved across the road, exchanging properties with Mr Stabler the local carrier. Dorothy was born on the 7th June of that year and George Leslie followed on the 28th March 1938.

Stanley Wiles continued to work for various farms around Barmston while also keeping pigs and running a market garden next door to his cottage.

The next extract is from an article in the Methodist Recorder when the well known writer Herbert Gee wrote about his memories of a visit to Barmston Village around 1951 when we see mention of not only Stanley but also of his daughter Dorothy:

‘No trumpets sounded. There was no display of bunting. As far as one could judge, life in the little Yorkshire village of Barmston went on much as usual that Tuesday evening. Some of the young men played cricket. A few children romped in the one street which is the only highway Barmston possesses –and when you come to the end of that road you have to turn round and go the same way back; Yet it will be long before I forget my visit – the gardens ablaze with colour; western windows glowing in the evening sunshine; gnats dancing in clouds above the pond;

the deep quietness; and what happened in the little dull building next to a meadow –like the Field of the Cloth of Gold –where sheep and lambs were grazing placidly. The little, dull building – a kind of square box – was the Methodist Chapel; nothing much to look at outside, and very plain inside. The door sticks when you try to open it; the seats are very hard; the iron stove is scarcely a thing of beauty; the small organ is hard to pedal. But all was spotless – Mr Wiles (who is society steward, poor steward and chapel steward) sees to that, loving his place of worship with all his heart, and serving it faithfully and with joy.

I was one of a small congregation – twenty, or so. I walked out of the bright sunshine into the cool shadow of that little house of God, and until the door was closed I could see the green fields and hear the sheep and lambs.

Sitting together on the front pew were three Barmston girls, Dorothy Wiles, Audrey Croft and Kathleen Rogerson – all were as quiet as mice. This evening, after months of instruction, the Minister, Rev.H.H.Osborne welcomed them into the fold of the Church.

Nor shall I soon forget the Communion service in that little chapel at Barmston – the communion rail so close to the pulpit that the minister could hardly pass between the two – and yet in the hour before sunset , how conscious we were of God's presence.

But there was something after that service which touched me. Before this service in Barmston, 4 girls from Ulrome had been welcomed into the Church: and what thrilled me so much at Barmston was that two of these girls had come to share in the service – surely a lovely thing to do.

I came away from Barmston feeling hopeful for the future of Methodism. It is a little place; but the Gospel is preached there and young hearts have been won. It is for this the Church of Christ exists.’

So wrote Mr Gee all those years ago. What a change he would see now if he were to return. Yes, the fields still surround the village and flowers still bloom in the gardens but the Chapel is closed and many caravans and chalets are now sited around the village bringing in lots of tourists during the holiday season. Some of these have since bought properties in the village to retire to and the number of “old” family residents still living here have dwindled during the last decade or so.

Eventually the farm where Stanley was working in Barmston was sold and Holly Croft became a road of bungalows off Sands Lane where, in 1972 the family relocated to. Eventually, Leslie, his son, continued to carry out not only the role of chapel steward, but the many other positions in the community that his father had held before him. Sadly, Dorothy died a couple of years ago, but Leslie continues to live in the village and carry on the traditions that his family have dedicated their whole lives to, making Barmston a happy and pleasant place to live.
